Memorial Day honors those who have died while serving in the United States military. Across the country, people celebrate through parades, family gatherings and ceremonies at cemeteries and memorials.


The Class of 1963 honors the bond of Loyal Forever in remembering two of our classmates, Edward Blackmon and Tommy Caruthers.


Edward attended Mathews, O'Henry JHS, and AHS with us.

Amphibious Force.


Both of these classmates died while serving our country and the names of both are on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial wall in Wash., DC.

Larry Tasby wrote a fellow marine's remembrance for Thomas on the website: "I grew up and attended high school with Thomas. He was a quiet person most of the time but enjoyed people. After graduation from high school, I lost touch with him until I learned of his death in VietNam. I will always remember and honor Thomas as a fellow-Marine and VietNam Veteran. Play that drum at those Pearly Gates until we are all together again."

All of us in the Class of '63 are called on to remember those of us who served in the military on two days each year— on Memorial Day for those who perished, and on Veterans Day (Nov 11th). Let's make an effort to reserve these special days for keeping alive our school years' memories and friendships with all who went on to serve our country.

The book—Texas Baseball High School: Top 100 Legends, by Brad Groghan—features interviews and articles on each of the top 100 teams in Texas high school baseball. He ranked Coach Raup's 1970 Brenham team 14th. That's pretty tall cotton.
